# A Message from our Pastor:

#### Dear Parishioners,

Last week we reflected on religion, comparing the practice of right religion to the hearth that holds, feeds, protects, and makes useful the fire that is faith. So what is faith? It has been described in many ways. Our Catechism teaches us that faith is first a gift and then also a human act. Faith as a gift, a grace, is given to us in a definitive way in the sacrament of Holy Baptism. We refer to this as the infusing of the theological virtue of faith. It is the grace by which, when we accept it, we are able to believe in God. "When St. Peter confessed that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God, Jesus declared to him that this revelation did not come "from flesh and blood", but from "my Father who is in heaven". Faith is a gift of God, a supernatural virtue infused by him. "Before this faith can be exercised, man must have the grace of God to move and assist him; he must have the interior helps of the Holy Spirit, who moves the heart and converts it to God, who opens the eyes of the mind and 'makes it easy for all to accept and believe the truth." (CCC 153)

This gift of God is active in us by the our own free choice. "Believing is possible only by grace and the interior helps of the Holy Spirit. But it is no less true that believing is an authentically human act. Trusting in God and cleaving to the truths He has revealed is contrary neither to human freedom nor to human reason. Even in human relations it is not contrary to our dignity to believe what other persons tell us about themselves and their intentions, or to trust their promises (for example, when a man and a woman marry) to share a communion of life with one another. If this is so, still less is it contrary to our dignity to "yield by faith the full submission of... intellect and will to God who reveals", and to share in an interior communion with him." (CCC 154) St. Thomas Aquinas says "Believing is an act of the intellect assenting to the divine truth by command of the will moved by God through grace." God does not force us to believe but makes it possible for us, for left on our own we could not decisively command our will to believe in Him.

Believing in God by faith encompasses more than accepting an intellectual understanding that God exists. It is our response to God that must become our whole way of living, of benign relationship with God, self and others and in fact all creation. Sometimes when we refer to "our Catholic Faith", we mean both the content of what we believe, the content of Divine Revelation, as well as the good practice of our religion, including our whole way of worshiping and serving God. As the holy apostle St. James says in his letter, faith without works is not faith at all. When faith is really alive in us, it is the beginning of eternal life.

Once the gift of faith is accepted it also requires an obedience of us. "By faith, man completely submits his intellect and his will to God. With his whole being man gives his assent to God the revealer. Sacred Scripture calls this human response to God, the author of revelation, "the obedience of faith" (CCC 143)

Just as we have the duty to obey in faith, we also have the duty to protect our faith. Faith can diminish and be lost altogether if we do not actively seek to guard against error and doubt, which abound in our society today. "The first commandment requires us to nourish and protect our faith with prudence and vigilance, and to reject everything that is opposed to it. There are various ways of sinning against faith: Voluntary doubt about the faith disregards or refuses to hold as true what God has revealed and the Church proposes for belief. Involuntary doubt refers to hesitation in believing, difficulty in overcoming objections connected with the faith, or also anxiety aroused by its obscurity. If deliberately cultivated doubt can lead to spiritual blindness. Incredulity is the neglect of revealed truth or the willful refusal to assent to it. Heresy is the obstinate post-baptismal denial of some truth which must be believed with divine and catholic faith, or it is likewise an obstinate doubt concerning the same; apostasy is the total repudiation of the Christian faith; schism is the refusal of submission to the Roman Pontiff or of communion with the members of the Church subject to him." (CCC 2088 & 2089) Deliberate doubt, incredulity and heresy are serious sins that should be confessed, lest they fester into apostasy. Struggling to understand some truth of faith that seems obscure to us is not to be confused with deliberate doubt or heresy. When we struggle to understand we are assenting to the fact that the revealed truth is just that- true! And we submit the lack is in our ability to understand. These things we may best describe as difficulties and as St John Henry Newman said, "Ten thousand difficulties do not make one doubt."

Faith both grows and is protected by the regular and robust practice of our Catholic religion. By frequenting the sacraments, developing a habit of daily prayer, taking advantage of the opportunities our parish and diocese provide to learn and understand our faith, and in serving God in our neighbor, our faith will grow and we will know God in an ever deepening and most personal way.

This week we have some special liturgies to celebrate. On Tuesday we celebrate the anniversary of the dedication of our parish church. Mass (in Latin with guest Latin choir) will be at 6:30 PM. On Wednesday we have our patronal feast of St. Nicholas. Adoration will begin at 9AM, Benediction at 6:30PM, the veneration of the relic of St. Nicholas and then Mass at 7PM with light refreshments to follow. On Thursday our Mass will be at 7PM for the Vigil of the Holy Day of the Immaculate Conception and Friday, our Holy Day Mass is at 7AM. Please be aware of these special times and very special occasions this week! Hope to see you as we celebrate our parish patron saint!
