A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

We continue again with our series on the Church, this week looking specifically at Papal Infallibility.

If you missed the first two parts then please check out our previous bulletins on our parish website.

The Pope, as the successor of St. Peter is the Vicar of Christ on earth and so is the visible head of the Church on earth. One of the charisms, special gifts of the Holy Spirit, that are given to the Pope so that he can fulfill his duty as the Vicar of Christ, is that of infallibly. To summarize what we have already seen: this is a charism given to the whole Church, and one that can only be exercised in union with the Pope. But the Pope, by himself, may also use this charism. This charism applies only to matters necessary for salvation, that is, matters of faith and morals. When the Pope uses this charism, we say he is speaking "ex cathedra", or from the chair, meaning the Chair of Peter, the symbol of St. Peter's authority to teach in the name of Christ and on behalf of the whole Church.

To speak "ex cathedra", the Pope must clearly state his intention to use the gift of infallibility and clearly define what teaching of faith and morals he is pronouncing as the true teaching of the Church that is to be held by all the faithful. Without this express statement that the Pope is intending to use the charism of infallibility, a teaching of the Pope is not "ex cathedra" and therefore not an infallible declaration. Ex cathedra pronouncements are actually quite rare in the history of the Church. Most of the definitive teaching of the Church happen by way of the Ordinary Magisterium.

In looking at Sacred Scripture and Sacred Tradition, we see the basis for our belief in Papal Infallibility. It is clear from the Gospels (Mt 16:18; Lk 22:31; Jn 21:15-17) that Our Lord made St. Peter the foundation of His Church, and gave to him the unique duty of strengthening the faith of his brothers, the other apostles, and made him the supreme pastor of the whole flock. St. Peter could not fulfill this task if he were subject to error when making a final decision on matters of faith and morality. There are examples of St. Peter exercising this role in the early Church, such as in Acts 1:15; 2:14; 15:7. The Church, from the beginning understood that what was entrusted to the Apostles was also entrusted to their successors. As St. Peter was personally given this charism by the Lord, it must also then be given to those in whom St. Peter and his ministry are perpetuated as the visible Head of the Church. The teaching primacy of the Pope is attested to from earliest times by the long list of Popes who condemned the early heresies that plagued the Church in the first several centuries. The Councils of Constantinople, Lyons and Florence proclaimed the primacy of the authority of the Pope, which in essence included infallibility and it was the First Vatican Council that finally defined it as a dogma of the Church.

The gift of infallibility is given to the Church to preserve the Faith in all its fullness and beauty so that we will not be confused about the truths that are necessary for our salvation. As we look at the charism of infallibility of the Pope, we see that while this gift is integral to the role of St. Peter in the Church, not everything, in fact not most things, a pope says are infallible. This Charism has been used sparingly by popes in the history of the Church. The teachings of the popes, in letters and homilies, talks and address, may over time, become part of the Ordinary Magisterium of the Church. The point here is that this happens over time and then only about matters of faith and morals. The opinions of popes on other matters, while valuable, are not only not infallible, they cannot become part of the Church's doctrine. In modern times, because of our modern means of communications, we get to see and hear much more from the Pope than in years past. This is a blessing in many ways, so long as we realize that when a pope is offering his opinion, it is valuable to us, but not necessarily one we to which we must hold fast.

Next week we will look a little more at the role of St. Peter in the Church.

Please join us for the praying of the Stations of the Cross weekly beginning Friday, February 16, 2024 and continuing two times per week during Lent:


Every Wednesday at 6:30PM (with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament).



symbolism. In our final session, we learned of the profound symbolism which takes place at every Mass: A "new Jerusalem" (the new people of God, adorned as a bride, to meet her husband). Surrounded by a high wall having twelve gates (symbolizing the 12 tribes) and built upon twelve foundations (the 12 apostles of the Lamb) which emphasize the continuity between the old and new people of God, but now washed clean in the blood of the Lamb. The Holy City (the Church) is figured as a "cube", symbolizing perfection, with its measurements being multiplications of 12 and its twelve gates being made from a single pearl (hence, the "pearly gates"). Importantly, there is no temple in Heaven, but rather God, Himself, as the sole focus "in Communion with His People" with "His Real Presence" providing all necessary light. Blessed, indeed, are those "who are invited to the supper of the Lamb!"
