A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

You may have seen that last week, the once great Catholic nation of France has enshrined the right to an abortion in its constitution, making it the first nation to call abortion a constitutional right. How tragic, how sad. The France of several centuries ago was arguably the most Catholic nation that ever existed. Today, it is already so far from that, and with this latest news, is farther still. As we mourn this move, and mourn we should, for blessed are the sorrowing, we had better also steel ourselves for the battle that is in our own midst with this same ideology. Now that Roe v Wade has been overturned, and the decision to outlaw or legalize the murder of life in the womb falls to each State, the liberal progressives in our nation will stop at nothing to see that abortion becomes a constitutional right. They will not be satisfied with this being a State by State decision, for that would certainly mean at least some States would remain a sanctuary where life in the womb is held as sacred. The tactics of the liberal progressives have not changed much, theirs is a well worn playbook. Anyone who is pro-life will be labeled a hater of women and an extremist. Probably somehow a racist too. But in their satanic frenzy to have abortion on demand for everyone, all the time, without limit or exception, they are now attacking the very foundation of our republic and labeling those who claim human rights come from God as "Christian Nationalist extremists". This tactic was rolled out a week or so ago on MSNBC, when a Politico "reporter" claimed that those who think rights come from God and not from a Congress or Supreme Court are "Christian Nationalists" and extremists. Her statement reveals a profound lack of understanding and knowledge of the founding of this nation. While there were many causal factors that led to our American Revolution, the one central and driving ideal was the truth that our basic human rights do not come from a king, an emperor, a parliament, a court, a congress or any other human authority. If they did come from any of these or any human authority they could not be inalienable, but could be taken away by the same human authority. The great American contribution to the history of nations is the wonderful and true proclamation that our basic human rights come from the Supreme Being, the Creator of all things, namely God. And further, that the role of government, regardless if it be a monarchy or republic, is to protect those rights for all its citizens and for all who live in that nation's borders. This ideal, so unique to the founding of our nation, is what protects us most from the threats of falling into totalitarianism and despotism. But for the sake of abortion, first and foremost, and for the sake of the other evils espoused by the liberal progressives, even that most foundational of all our American ideals, is not beyond attack. How can this be? We have to understand the that our modern day liberal progressivism is neither really liberal nor progressive in the truest sense of those words. Our modern liberal progressivism is practically, if not outright, atheistic. A true belief in God as He really is, as He reveals Himself to be, and therefore also the law of God, stands in the way of their agenda which is rooted in the three temptations of Our Lord in the Gospel. It is an agenda of pleasure, power (including money) and vainglory. I believe that little segment on MSNBC actually reveals a great deal about what is to come and should serve as a warning to us all who hold fast to the truth, who remain faithful to Christ and His Gospel, of how we will be under attack to an extent we have not seen in our times. The tempest is coming, and it will not be pretty, but we have nothing to fear. Now is the time to prepare, especially by prayer. Pray fervently. Pray courageously. Pray constantly. And take heart, Christ is already victorious and we have only to keep our eyes and our hearts fixed on Him.

Bible Study Thursdays

Thank you to everyone who participated in our recently concluded Bible Study! When we began, we knew the "Book of Revelation" would be full of symbolism. In our final session, we learned of the profound symbolism which takes place at every Mass: A "new Jerusalem" (the new people of God, adorned as a bride, to meet her husband). Surrounded by a high wall having twelve gates (symbolizing the 12 tribes) and built upon twelve foundations (the 12 apostles of the Lamb) which emphasize the continuity between the old and new people of God, but now washed clean in the blood of the Lamb. The Holy City (the Church) is figured as a "cube", symbolizing perfection, with its measurements being multiplications of 12 and its twelve gates being made from a single pearl (hence, the "pearly gates"). Importantly, there is no temple in Heaven, but rather God, Himself, as the sole focus "in Communion with His People" providing all necessary light. Blessed, indeed, are those "who are invited to the supper of the Lamb!"
