A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

Several times in homilies you have heard me mention one of the errors of our times called Modernism. Modernism has been called the synthesis of all the heresies and errors that have preceded it.

A heresy is a false teaching about some aspect or doctrine of our faith. Errors might be described the same way. Throughout our history these things have popped up, often created by a member of the clergy, and have led many people to confusion, false understandings and doubts about God Himself, our salvation in Christ and many other aspects of our faith. Sometimes these errors were about matters the Church had believed consistently but had not formally defined as part of the faith. Often these false teachings became widespread and took several centuries to correct. Most of them were never completely overcome and still exist even if no longer widely believed. Some see occasional resurgences.

Modernism, which developed in the early twentieth century, is a resurgence of many errors that coalesce into one. Its adherents hold to the belief "that Christian dogma is historically contingent, continuously evolving, ultimately inexpressible in rational formulae, and ultimately discernible only on a subjective basis". (Excerpt From "Flee from Heresy: A Catholic Guide to Ancient and Modern Errors" by Bishop Athanasius Schneider)

This synthesizes all the errors that precede it on the basis that all of them took an approach to Christian doctrine that was subjective and that a particular aspect of faith was contingent and evolving. Modernism says all truth is contingent on its historical context, always evolving, even into something it was not, and therefore highly subjective, meaning that truth is not necessarily true for all times and peoples.

This error remains important for us to understand today for many reasons, including that so much of our contemporary society's issues, the issues that seem to divide our country the most, are debated from a Modernist perspective of truth. Modernism quickly gave rise to Moral Relativism, applying the Modernist understanding of truth to all morality. No doubt you have heard someone say, when confronted with a moral truth, that it is "not true for me!", or "that's your truth, not mine!". This way of thinking continues to be strong regarding many moral truths, despite the rather obvious fact that truth is true for everyone, and is not contingent, that is dependent, on the context of culture or generational differences.

There is good and there is evil and there is truth. None of these are created by man and none of these may be defined him. When something is true, just as when something is good or evil, it is so in and of itself and it's truth, it's goodness or it's lack of goodness (evil) is not contingent upon anyone of us. When we help others to the truth, especially the truth that bears on their eternal destiny, it is the most loving thing we can do, for we are helping them to the greatest good of all. As Pope St. John Paul II taught: "In fact, genuine understanding and compassion must mean love for the person, for his true good, for his authentic freedom. And this does not result, certainly, from concealing or weakening moral truth, but rather from proposing it in its most profound meaning as an outpouring of God's eternal Wisdom, which we have received in Christ, and as a service to man, to the growth of his freedom and to the attainment of his happiness."

It can seem like the whole world is against us in trying to deny the truth about God, religion, and morality. But just as we must take courage and never give in to the Modernist or Moral Relativist way of thinking, we must also take hope. Humanity is not lost, for we were made for God and made in His image and likeness and error will never completely satisty us. To quote Pope St. John Paul II once more, "But no darkness of error or of sin can totally take away from man the light of God the Creator. In the depths of his heart there always remains a yearning for

absolute truth and a thirst to attain full knowledge of it. This is eloquently proved by man's tireless search for knowledge in all fields. It is proved even more by his search for *the meaning of life.*"

To be eligible to donate blood, individuals must be at least 16 years old (with parental consent required for 16-year-olds), weigh a minimum of 110 pounds, and be in good health.
