A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

As you will remember during this past Lent you were given the opportunity to take a survey about your faith and your experience of our parish life called the Disciple-maker Index. We have begun working with a coach from the Catholic Leadership Institute to review our results and to use them to help us craft a pastoral plan for our parish that will include 3 goals and some concrete ways of pursuing those goals. I thank you for your input and look forward to sharing more in the near future.

Last week we looked at two errors to faith that are prevalent in our society today, namely modernism and its offspring moral relativism. This week we will look at another error and its offspring, Religious Indifferentism and its offspring Religious Pluralism. Religious Indifferentism holds that all religions are equal and equally able to bring man salvation, and that there is no one true religion nor is there any obligation on us to seek the one true faith. This was all condemned by three popes, first by Venerable Pope Leo XIII in 1824, by Pope Gregory XVI in 1832 and by Venerable Pope Pius IX in 1864. In condemning this error the popes relied on Sacred Scripture and the consistent teaching of the Church from the very beginning. Religious Pluralism holds that all world religions are positively willed by God, in other words that God has actively inspired them and desired them to come about, and that they are therefore sanctifying for those who adhere to them.

You probably recognize these ideas and sadly may have heard them passed off as the "new" teaching of the Church. Nothing could be further from the truth. The Second Vatican Council clearly reaffirmed that there is only one true faith and we have an obligation of conscience to seek that truth. It also made clear how those of differing faiths can come to salvation, that is, by their seeking of the truth and trying to live by it which then joins them by desire to Christ, Who is the Truth, and to His Church, the custodian of His truth and grace. Everyone who is saved by Christ's sacrifice and the grace that He has bestowed from it on the Church, which dispenses that grace. No one can be saved by the practice of a false religion per se. Meaning that if someone who is not Catholic is to be saved, it is by Christ and by their individual seeking the truth and striving to live it, which joins that person to Christ and His Church and not because of any worship found in any other religion.

"Only the religion established by God and fulfilled in Christ, with its divinely revealed worship, is supernatural, holy, and pleasing to God. All other religions are inherently false, and their forms of worship pernicious, or at least unavailing for eternal life."

"There can be no true religion other than that which is founded on the revealed word of God: which revelation, begun from the beginning and continued under the Old Law, Christ Jesus Himself perfected under the New Law."

"God has revealed the way in which He desires to be worshipped in Christ, and "the Catholic Church is alone in keeping the true worship." To practice a false worship, or neglect to discover and offer right worship, offends God and harms the soul" (Excerpts From: Flee from Heresv: A Catholic Guide to Ancient and Modern Errors by Bishop Athanasius Schneider)

This is not to disparage anyone who practices another faith or religion. On the contrary it is their sincerity in seeking truth and very often their zeal that we should and do recognize as worthy of commendation and which can give to all of us a profound example of seeking God. We must however, not be fooled into thinking that any other religion is in and of itself a good willed by God or that it affords in and of itself a means to eternal life. "Although God is able to give graces to a man who practices a false religion in view of his innocent ignorance and sincere good will, such graces would in nowise be mediated by or owing to the false religion itself. Rather, grace may be given despite the man's error, and in order to lead him out of that error into the truth of right faith." (Excerpt From: Flee from Heresy: A Catholic Guide to Ancient and Modern Errors by Bishop Athanasius Schneider)

The only religion that God wills is the one He has revealed, beginning with the Jewish religion, which has been fulfilled in Christ, and Who established the One, True, Catholic and Apostolic Church, namely the Catholic Church. To believe in Christ is to be a true child of Abraham. (see *Galatians 3:29*) Other religions arise, even with good intentions, from ignorance or worse from sin or even as a working of the Evil One, whose purpose is to confuse and lead us astray. "It is necessarily impossible for God, the Supreme Truth, to be the author of any error whatsoever" (*Pope Leo XIII*). God cannot reveal Himself as one thing to some people and another to others. It is also impossible for God, Who is One, to desire disunity or disharmony among those He has created to be one in Him.

We should not assume from this that if we are Catholic we are automatically going to heaven. Nor should we assume others are not. What we should realize is that God revealed Himself to man through Christ, Who established One Church for the salvation of all and that in the Church we have ALL the means necessary for this. It is still up to us to make good use of these means and never take for granted the gift of eternal life. Perhaps the most perilous lie of all is that everyone just gets to go to heaven no matter what. The Lord Himself is so clear that is not the case. "The road to damnation is wide and many choose to walk it." (*Mt* 7:13.) We indeed ought to be about the business each day of securing eternal life through fear and trembling, and this with great hope and gratitude for all the gifts of grace the Lord offers us in His Church.

the Most Reverend Alfred A. Schlert, Bishop of the Diocese of Allentown," said Wiegers.

To be eligible to donate blood, individuals must be at least 16 years old (with parental consent required for 16-year-olds), weigh a minimum of 110 pounds, and be in good health.
