A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners,

During this month dedicated to the Pro-Life Cause, we continue to reflect on these issues. One common question is this: are there any circumstances when an abortion is acceptable? In terms of direct abortion procedures as we know them today, the answer is no. However, if a case arises, and sometimes they do, when a pregnant woman has a life threatening medical condition and the only medical intervention that will save her life is one that will also result in the death of her unborn child, it is permissible for this intervention to be done. This is morally permissible only if there is no reasonably safe way to save both lives. It is permissible as the medical procedure is one that saves a life and the intention of the procedure is not to kill the unborn child. In these cases, the loss of the child is tragic and not the intended consequence. Direct abortion procedures, those done at abortion clinics, are not life saving medical interventions. Despite the rhetoric to the contrary, abortion mills do not save lives. In fact, many women have to be rushed to a hospital from abortion mills to save their lives from the dangerous direct abortion procedures done in these places. Sadly, tragically, some of them do not make it.

We must also mention, that there are many mothers who, suffering a health crisis, risk their lives and some who give their lives, to bring their child to term. While this is not strictly speaking, morally required, the heroic sacrifices of these mothers for their children is to be honored and praised. Their witness both to the sacredness and beauty of their children's lives and to the sacrificial aspects of motherhood, is one that we must not fail to appreciate and love. We should sing the praises of these heroic women and hold them up as shining examples of the greatness of womanhood.

What about cases of rape and incest? Let's be clear about this first, rape is a horrible crime and grave sin. Rapists should be dealt severe punishment by our justice system. That said, we must also know that due to the horrible trauma of the event, it is extremely rare that a pregnancy results from a rape. In those rare cases, the child in the womb is also an innocent victim. It is never permissible to punish the innocent for the crimes of another. In this case we are talking about punishing an innocent victim with death. Those who advocate for allowing abortions for those rare pregnancies that are the result of a rape, are advocating that an innocent suffer a much more severe punishment than the actual criminal. This makes no sense in any way, certainly not morally, not according to any sense of justice. In these rare cases, what is needed for the woman, of course also a victim of this terrible crime, is much counseling that helps her recover, and as part of that counseling, real help in bringing the child to birth and then deciding if giving the child for adoption is the right choice for her. Our adoption laws and procedures are another area where we need to build a stronger pro-life culture. There are many couples who are looking to welcome children by adoption and we need improvements in that process. When a pregnancy arises out of an incestuous relationship, the same holds true as in cases of rape, especially as to the innocence of the child in the womb. Again the answer here is not abortion but good counseling that promotes healing and support to bring the child to birth and then decide if adoption is the right choice for the mother in her particular situation.

Why do we hear the pro-abortionists constantly call for exceptions in law to allow for abortions in the case of rape an incest, especially in the States that protect life in the womb? The pro-abortion lobby's push for these exceptions has nothing to do with numbers, as the actual number of pregnancies resulting from rape or incest is quite low. Likewise the number of abortions due to these has always been a small fraction, about 1.5 %, of all abortions each year. The real reason for the push for these exceptions is to create an acceptance of abortion in some circumstances. In the case of rape and incest, we are quite naturally and quite rightly, sympathetic to the plight of the women who have been victimized. The pro-abortion lobby seeks to exploit that sympathy by redirecting it to accept that abortion in these cases can be justified. Once one accepts that abortion can be a valid solution in these extreme circumstances it paves the way for a more wider acceptance of abortion as an answer in other difficult circumstances. We must not be fooled by the lies and deceptions of the pro-abortion lobby. The direct killing of innocent life is never a valid solution to any of life's problems, no matter how tragic and sad those problems may be.

What about an exception for the health of the mother? This too is a ruse. Health is not the same as life, which we covered in the beginning of this reflection. The health exception is one that would in effect allow abortion for any reason whatsoever. For example, a proabortion doctor might suggest to a woman that this pregnancy has caused her to be anxious or feeling depressed. That would be all that is needed to qualify for an abortion under a health clause. Again, we must not be fooled by the pro-abortion lobby which seeks to use clever wordsmithing to hide their actual intent.

We close this weeks reflection with the words of St. Mother Theresa given at the National Prayer Breakfast in Washington DC in 1994. In her speech, she said: "But I feel that the greatest destroyer of peace today is abortion, because it is a war against the child, a direct killing of the innocent child, murder by the mother herself. And if we accept that a mother can kill even her own child, how can we tell other people not to kill one another? How do we persuade a woman not to have an abortion? As always, we must persuade her with love and we remind ourselves that love means to be willing to give until it hurts. Jesus gave even His life to love us. So, the mother who is thinking of abortion, should be helped to love, that is, to give until it hurts her plans, or her free time, to respect the life of her child. The father of that child, whoever he is, must also give until it hurts.

By abortion, the mother does not learn to love, but kills even her own child to solve her problems. And, by abortion, that father is told that he does not have to take any responsibility at all for the child he has brought into the world. The father is likely to put other women into the same trouble. So abortion just leads to more abortion. Any country that accepts abortion is not teaching its people to love, but to use any violence to get what they want. This is why the greatest destroyer of love and peace is abortion... I will tell you something beautiful. We are fighting abortion by adoption — by care of the mother and adoption for her baby. We have saved thousands of lives... Please don't kill the child. I want the child. Please give me the child. I am willing to accept any child who would be aborted and to give that child to a married couple who will love the child and be loved by the child.

If we remember that God loves us, and that we can love others as He loves us, then America can become a sign of peace for the world. From here, a sign of care for the weakest of the weak — the unborn child — must go out to the world. If you become a burning light of justice and peace in the world, then really you will be true to what the founders of this country stood for." Peace -Father Adam
