A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners,

The entire month of October we have reflected on various aspects of being pro-life as well as some of the current threats to life in our society today. As a final reflection I thought it would help to sum some things up with a few quotes from Pope St. John Paul II's landmark papal teaching on the sacredness of human life, his encyclical letter called Evangelium Vitae (EV), in English, the Gospel of Life. Promulgated in 1995, Evangelium Vitae was a monumental teaching document that took years to write and was done in response to the request of the Church's bishops and incorporated input from the bishops of the Church from around the world and also synthesized the consistent teaching of the Church through two millennia of Christianity. The encyclical is considered one of Pope St. John Paul II's greatest contributions to the Church's theology on the sacredness of human life.

He begins with these words: "The Gospel of life is at the heart of Jesus' message. Lovingly received day after day by the Church, it is to be preached with dauntless fidelity as "good news" to the people of every age and culture. At the dawn of salvation, it is the Birth of a Child which is proclaimed as joyful news: "I bring you good news of a great joy which will come to all the people; for to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord" (Lk 2:10-11). The source of this "great joy" is the Birth of the Saviour; but Christmas also reveals the full meaning of every human birth, and the joy which accompanies the Birth of the Messiah is thus seen to be the foundation and fulfilment of joy at every child born into the world (cf. Jn 16:21)." (EV 1)

He then explains the dignity and worth of every human life and how death entered the world as a result of sin and how the first death was a violent one, the murder of Able by Cain, through which the Scriptures teach us that the death of the innocent is a sin that cries to God for a remedy, a sin, a grave injustice that cries out to be made right. We also learn that we have a real, even if limited, responsibility to all our brothers and sisters.

"Like the first fratricide, every murder is a violation of the "spiritual" kinship uniting mankind in one great family, in which all share the same fundamental good: equal personal dignity. Not infrequently the kinship "of flesh and blood" is also violated; for example when threats to life arise within the relationship between parents and children, such as happens in abortion or when, in the wider context of family or kinship, euthanasia is encouraged or practised." (EV 8)

"The voice of the blood shed by men continues to cry out, from generation to generation, in ever new and different ways. The Lord's question: "What have you done?", which Cain cannot escape, is addressed also to the people of today, to make them realize the extent and gravity of the attacks against life which continue to mark human history; to make them discover what causes these attacks and feeds them; and to make them ponder seriously the consequences which derive from these attacks for the existence of individuals and peoples." (EV 10)

The Pope also explains the connection between abortion and contraception. Though they violate different commandments and attack different aspects of the dignity God has bestowed on humanity, they are intrinsically related. The rejection of the sacredness of the meaning and purpose of our human sexuality leads to a rejection of the life created by the conjugal act, which in God's plan is to be the fruit of love between a husband and wife.

"Indeed, the pro- abortion culture is especially strong precisely where the Church's teaching on contraception is rejected. Certainly, from the moral point of view contraception and abortion are specifically different evils: the former contradicts the full truth of the sexual act as the proper expression of conjugal love, while the latter destroys the life of a human being; the former is opposed to the virtue of chastity in marriage, the latter is opposed to the virtue of justice and directly violates the divine commandment "You shall not kill". But despite their differences of nature and moral gravity, contraception and abortion are often closely connected, as fruits of the same tree." (EV 13)

The Pope also explains in great detail that we must not be discouraged by current moral state of the world. Our ability to press on in proclaiming the Gospel of Life is rooted in the triumph of Our Lord over death and therefore in the certain victory of the Culture of Life over the current Culture of Death. He also then affirms in the most authoritative manner the intrinsic evil of direct abortion and the obligation of every Catholic and every person who seeks the truth to oppose its legality.

He declared: "Human life is sacred and inviolable at every moment of existence, including the initial phase which precedes birth. All human beings, from their mothers' womb, belong to God who searches them and knows them, who forms them and knits them together with his own hands, who gazes on them when they are tiny shapeless embryos and already sees in them the adults of tomorrow whose days are numbered and whose vocation is even now written in the "book of life" (cf. Ps 139: 1, 13-16). There too, when they are still in their mothers' womb-as many passages of the Bible bear witness-they are the personal objects of God's loving and fatherly providence." (EV 61)

And he further declared: "Therefore, by the authority which Christ conferred upon Peter and his Successors, in communion with the Bishops-who on various occasions have condemned abortion and who in the aforementioned consultation, albeit dispersed throughout the world, have shown unanimous agreement concerning this doctrine-I declare that direct abortion, that is, abortion willed as an end or as a means, always constitutes a grave moral disorder, since it is the deliberate killing of an innocent human being. This doctrine is based upon the natural law and upon the written Word of God, is transmitted by the Church's Tradition and taught by the ordinary and universal Magisterium." (EV 62)

The Pope then went on to explain this condemnation of direct abortion also applied to the killing of human embryos, created for experimentation and other purposes. And he then spends some time explaining the equally grave evil of euthanasia or assisted suicide. Even when the motives may be genuine and good, euthanasia is a perversion of true mercy.

"The choice of euthanasia becomes more serious when it takes the form of a murder committed by others on a person who has in no way requested it and who has never consented to it. The height of arbitrariness and injustice is reached when certain people, such as physicians or legislators, arrogate to themselves the power to decide who ought to live and who ought to die. Once again we find ourselves before the temptation of Eden: to become like God who "knows good and evil" (cf. Gen 3:5). God alone has the power over life and death: "It is I who bring both death and life" (Dt 32:39; cf. 2 Kg 5:7; 1 Sam 2:6). But he only exercises this power in accordance with a plan of wisdom and love." (EV 66)

The Pope then explains the need for our civil laws to conform with the Divine Law. "The doctrine on the necessary conformity of civil law with the moral law is in continuity with the whole tradition of the Church." (EV 72)

"Abortion and euthanasia are thus crimes which no human law can claim to legitimize. There is no obligation in conscience to obey such laws; instead there is a grave and clear obligation to oppose them by conscientious objection. From the very beginnings of the Church, the apostolic preaching reminded Christians of their duty to obey legitimately constituted public authorities (cf. Rom 13:1-7; 1 Pet 2:13-14), but at the same time it Please see **CONTINUED** later in this bulletin

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firmly warned that "we must obey God rather than men" (Acts 5:29)...In the case of an intrinsically unjust law, such as a law permitting abortion or euthanasia, it is therefore never licit to obey it, or to "take part in a propaganda campaign in favour of such a law, or vote for it"." (EV 73)

The Pope also explains that serving the pro-life cause is a service not only of justice but of charity. It is Christ Himself whom we serve when we defend the most innocent and the most defenseless, who constitute the poorest of the poor in our society today.

"By virtue of our sharing in Christ's royal mission, our support and promotion of human life must be accomplished through the service of charity, which finds expression in personal witness, various forms of volunteer work, social activity and political commitment. This is a particularly pressing need at the present time, when the "culture of death" so forcefully opposes the "culture of life" and often seems to have the upper hand. But even before that it is a need which springs from "faith working through love" (Gal 5:6). As the Letter of James admonishes us: "What does it profit, my brethren, if a man says he has faith but has not works? Can his faith save him? If a brother or sister is ill-clad and in lack of daily food, and one of you says to them, ?Go in peace, be warmed and filled, without giving them the things needed for the body, what does it profit? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead" (2:14-17)." (EV 87)

"The Gospel of life is for the whole of human society. To be actively pro-life is to contribute to the renewal of society through the promotion of the common good. It is impossible to further the common good without acknowledging and defending the right to life, upon which all the other inalienable rights of individuals are founded and from which they develop." (EV 101)

While it is not possible to capture the whole of this great teaching in one small reflection, I hope the above excerpts offer some of the important aspects and can serve as a final summary for our reflections for this month of respect life. I encourage you to read this encyclical in its entirety. Not just written to condemn immorality, this teaching expounds on the great gift of God to us and beauty of accepting the will of God. One final point is the Pope's beautiful appeal to those who have been involved with an abortion. An appeal to repent and know and trust in the powerful Mercy of Our Loving God, Who heals every ill and is able to forgive every sin.

"I would now like to say a special word to women who have had an abortion. The Church is aware of the many factors which may have influenced your decision, and she does not doubt that in many cases it was a painful and even shattering decision. The wound in your heart may not yet have healed. Certainly what happened was and remains terribly wrong. But do not give in to discouragement and do not lose hope. Try rather to understand what happened and face it honestly. If you have not already done so, give yourselves over with humility and trust to repentance. The Father of mercies is ready to give you his forgiveness and his peace in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. To the same Father and his mercy you can with sure hope entrust your child. With the friendly and expert help and advice of other people, and as a result of your own painful experience, you can be among the most eloquent defenders of everyone's right to life. Through your commitment to life, whether by accepting the birth of other children or by welcoming and caring for those most in need of someone to be close to them, you will become promoters of a new way of looking at human life." (EV 99)
