A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

As we celebrate the Thanksgiving Holiday, we pause to consider all that we have for which to be grateful and to whom we owe our gratitude, first and foremost, it is to God Himself. It is quite fitting and also a good testament to those who first came to settle "the new world", that days of Thanksgiving have been a part of our history since the first Christians came here. I cannot help but wonder how many people will actually do that on Thanksgiving Day, that is, give thanks to God. Despite the long standing history, the very idea of setting aside a day as a nation to offer thanks to God is something that must seem somewhat foreign to many people in our nation today. I don't mean to sound negative, but even for those not hostile to religion, the practice of religion has been reduced by many to what "I" can get out of it for "myself". Yet in every Mass we hear these words: "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God... It is right and just." It is right and it fulfills the demands of justice to give thanks to God, for from Him all blessings come and all that is good, and only what is truly good for us, comes from Him.

How often do we pause to think that our practice of religion, our worship of God, is something that we owe Him. That it is actually a virtue. Of course to really give thanks, to really fulfill what justice demands is to do so with a wiling heart and not just because we have to do it. Knowing it is something we have to do may be what got us to church initially and even from time to time may have kept us coming when our wills were a little weak and sluggish. Certainly that is not a bad thing, but justice is more than an external observance. The "ought to do it" must become a "want to do it", if our presence is to be meaningful and if the fulfillment of justice is more than external obedience. We might not often think of justice as a matter of loving the good, loving what is right, yet that is it's higher motivation.

Justice understood as motivated by a true love for the good also leads us to further understand that the virtue of religion is more than going to church. According to St. Thomas Aquinas, the virtue of religion does not focus solely on worshipping and serving God, it also directs all of our actions toward God for His glory, making our entire life religious. Just as God does not want us to give thanks to Him only once a year, so too, God does not just want an hour a week. He wants us to live our entire lives with, in and through Him. It is not simply that God demands our attention; we desperately need Him and the guidance of His grace. Worship puts us into right relation with Him by recognizing His primacy and humbly putting ourselves before Him to receive His blessing. The worship we owe Him is the worship He Himself provides for us through the liturgy of His Church, the high point and center of which is the Holy Mass, the celebration of the Holy Eucharist, which is also the highest act of Thanksgiving we can offer to God.

The virtue of religion, of which giving God thanks is a part, is not primarily about what we do, but refocuses our lives on what He has done and what He continues to do, on the communion with us that He desires and the communion with each other that only He can create. We need to recover the virtue of religion to refocus us on the primacy of God. His glory should shine forth in the life and liturgy of the Church; He is what is most needed in our lives and in our country. Religion points us to God's centrality and the urgent necessity of recovering a right relation with Him that will reorder our priorities in such a way as to create a more just, peaceful and loving world.


Miraculous Medal Novena


