A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

The holy season of Advent begins today! It is a season of hope and joyful expectation. A time when we learn to wait for the Lord and so can be an especially good occasion to focus on developing the virtue the patience. We all know how difficult it can be to cultivate this virtue in our lives. Because it is a great sign of holiness it is certainly worth our effort. This is especially so when it comes to having patience is maintained in the face of adversity when it is motivated by love for God and neighbor. That it is not easy is affirmed by the fact that St. Thomas Aquinas places patience under the moral virtue of fortitude. It takes courage as well as humility to be patient when we are faced with trials, obstacles and even outright hostility. The best place to look to begin to understand this virtue is to ponder the patience of God Himself. If we think we are faced with obstacles and, yes, even the hostility of an increasingly uncivil world, consider how God Himself is ignored and even hated, yet He responds by offering the grace of conversion and waiting and waiting for it to be accepted. To be sure, there will be justice, there will be a time of judgment, a time when the opportunity for conversion has passed, but yet God offers an abundance of time for this conversion. His patience with us knows no limit, until the end of time itself, when in a very literal way time runs out.

According to St. Thomas, "Patience is a virtue attached to the virtue of fortitude, which hinders a man from departing from right reason illumined by faith by yielding to difficulties and to sadness." Have we ever considered that patience is powerful? Again, this is why it is attached to fortitude, meaning it is actually a way of exercising fortitude. The power of patience is dual in nature. On the one hand it keeps the one exercising it, the one being patient, from being overcome or overwhelmed by difficulty, distress or persecution. It also preserves the use of right reason. If we think about that, when we lose our patience we often then act in anger and without thinking, often in an unreasonable way. Patience preserves the use of reason which preserves the image of God in us. The power of patience is also external to the one exercising this virtue. When another witnesses or is the receiver of patience it can be a powerful call to conversion, because it is a witness to a love that is greater, the Love of God. While this may not be evident in the moment, it is often the case after one has time to consider the patience that has been shown to him or her. How interesting that St. Thomas also notes that patience preserves one from sadness. Have we ever been impatient and then felt satisfied because of it? Probably not ever. Just the opposite, when we are impatient we end up sad, or at least less joyful, as our peace, our equanimity of soul has been disturbed. We often attribute this disturbance to others, or to circumstances outside of ourselves, but that is deceptive. It is really our lack of virtue, especially patience that disturbs our peace most. St. Augustine says it is patience that "allows us to bear the evils of life with equanimity of soul." And how true that is!

To develop patience, first reflect on the patience that God has shown you throughout your life. Deeply consider all the times that He has sent the grace of forgiveness and conversion and how many times He has blessed you, perhaps even when it was least deserved. When approaching the Lord in Holy Communion, consider that His patience is now offered to you as gift. From where do we get the patience to endure the difficulties of life if not from Him, Who is all patient and Whose love for us knows no limit!
