A Message from Our Pastor:

Dear Parishioners.

During this Christmas Season we consider that one of the ways we can be devoted to Our Lord is though His infancy. The whole mystery of Our Lord's life is present to us through the Sacred Liturgy and so we can have a devotion to Our Lord in His Passion, Death and Resurrection and also His Incarnation and His Infancy. During the Christmas Season it is certainly fitting to pause and pray at the Nativity scene, praying to the Infant Jesus. Our devotion to Our Lord in His Infancy, however, does not have to be confined to the Christmas Season. We can pray to Him in His Infant "state" continually. Such is the origin of the famous statue of the Infant Jesus of Prague, which we have in our parish church. Below is a little history of this statue and devotion to the Infant Jesus which has grown throughout the Church through this miraculous statue.

The Infant Jesus of Prague

In the city of Prague, Bohemia, (today the Czech Republic) in the beginning of the seventeenth century, Princess Polyxenia of Lobkowitz had received as a wedding gift from her mother, a statue of the Infant Jesus, previously brought from Spain.

It was a small statue, just nineteen inches tall, made of wood, wax, and cloth. It represented the infant Jesus dressed in royal robes and wearing a king's crown, with the left foot barely visible under a long white tunic. The left hand encircles a miniature globe, surmounted by a cross, signifying the world-wide kingship of the Christ Child. The right hand is extended in blessing with the first two fingers being upraised to symbolize the two natures of Christ, while the folded thumb and last two fingers touch each other representing the unity of the Father, The Son, and the Holy Spirit in the mystery of the Blessed Trinity. The face of Our Lord as represented in this statue has a strange power of evoking sentiments of deep gratitude of the mystery of God-made-Man. For all His majestic posture and regal attire, the little King of Prague is more striking for His outward expression of human littleness than by the impression of hidden greatness.

After the death of her husband, the princess devoted herself to works of charity and was particularly helpful to the Carmelites in Prague. In 1628, when the Carmelite Monastery had been reduced to poverty, owing to the ravages of war, the princess gave her precious statue to the Carmelites, saying, "I give you what I prize most highly in the world; honor and respect the Child Jesus and you shall never be in want."

Her gift was placed in the Carmelite oratory. The words of the princess proved prophetic, for as long as the Carmelites kept up their devotion to the Divine Infant of Prague, everything prospered with them.

The Carmelites were later forced to flee from the city, and in the confusion of the war, they were unable to take with them their miraculous statue. The invaders seized it and threw it into a pile of rubbish.

In 1635, peace once more came to Prague and the Carmelites returned. One of them, Father Cyril, who had previously received great spiritual help through his devotion to the Infant of Prague, sought the statue and found it amidst the rubbish.

Overjoyed, he again placed the statue in the oratory. Father Cyril knelt in prayer before the small statue. Gazing upon the simple statue of the Child Jesus, he contemplated the most marvelous event in the history of the world, the Incarnation. He was filled with awe and wonder has he prayed to the God who became a child because of his love for us.

Suddenly, the statue spoke to him. Father Cyril was stunned as he heard these words of promise:

"Have Mercy On Me And I Will Have Mercy On You. Give Me Hands And I Will Give You Peace. The More You Honor Me, The More I Will Bless You."

Startled by these words, Father Cyril examined the statue, and upon drawing aside the mantle covering it, he found that both hands of the statue were broken off. The hands were later restored to the statue through the generosity of a devotee of the Divine Child.

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Many miracles have occurred through intercession to the Divine Infant. During one invasion, all the children of the city were taken to the Church for protection—praying to the Infant, they were all saved. For almost four centuries, this promise of protection and blessing has inspired devotion and love of the Infant Jesus of Prague.

This devotion has spread from Prague throughout the whole Church. Today, replicas and models of the small statue are honored in every part of the world. The list of blessings attributed by devotees of the Infant Jesus is endless: health restored, financial problems solved, gifts of peace of mind and soul, and innumerable healings, both physical and spiritual. God has been astonishingly generous in blessing those who have been devoted to his Infant Son.

St. Therese, the Little Flower, was also a most fervent venerator and one of the great saints who has inspired greater devotion to the Infant Jesus.

For more than three centuries, this promise has inspired a worldwide devotion to the Miraculous Infant Jesus of Prague. The original statue is still preserved in the church of St. Mary of Victory in Prague, under the care of the Carmelite Order.

The statue provides spiritual uplift for millions of people who have adopted the Holy Infant's call to humility, simplicity, and sincerity and to become little in order to become great and pleasing before Christ the King.

Devotion to the Miraculous Infant Jesus celebrates the "Child of God"—the great mystery of the Incarnation. With Childlike simplicity and trust we believe in the humanity and divinity of Christ and rejoice in God's caring and protective love for us. The Infant reminds us that God is holding us in the palm of His hand.

The spiritual meditation the statue inspires is the reason why the Infant Jesus of Prague is so continuously appealing to human hearts all over the world, which He has so firmly in His hands. You can find His statue in almost any church, convent, monastery and house, representing a Divine Protection toward His devotees.
