A Message from Our Pastor:



Dear Parishioners.

I must say I continue to be both impressed and inspired by our new Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV. In his homily for last Sunday, at the Inauguration Mass, said this, referring to the Church:

"For our part, we want to be a small leaven of unity, communion and fraternity within the world. We want to say to the world, with humility and joy: Look to Christ! Come closer to him! Welcome his word that enlightens and consoles! Listen to his offer of love and become his one family: in the one Christ, we are one. This is the path to follow together, among ourselves but also with our sister Christian churches, with those who follow other religious paths, with those who are searching for God, with all women and men of good will, in order to build a new world where peace reigns!"

How wonderful that he says the focus of the Church is to show Christ to the world, and that this is the path to peace and unity among all people. Drawing closer to Christ is the way to overcome every obstacle. This begins at the level of the parish, in fact at the level of each one of us as disciples. It is at the parish where our personal relationship with Our Lord is lived out. It is lived out together, and together, the family of our parish must reveal Christ to the world. This is why this pope, I believe, is going to seek to bring a greater unity to the Church herself. A unity that must be rooted in the truth that is Christ and the Love that is Christ. The Church, and so the parish, cannot be a beacon to the world, or to the community around us, without a unity rooted in both this very same truth and love. Love each other, as He has loved you, believe in the truth that is Christ and then this parish will always continue to thrive and grow and be a refuge of hope to our community.

Below we continue looking at pope's named Leo. I found it fascinating, I hope you do too.

Peace- Father Adam

Pope Leo V- (served as pope in the second half of the year 903) Captured, imprisoned and executed after only two months as pope by a rebellious cardinal who wanted to be pope. The historian Auxilius called him a man of God who led a praiseworthy life of exemplary holiness.

Pope Leo VI (served as pope for seven months from June of 928 until February of 929) Despite this short time in the office of the Holy See, he did manage to carry out a number of acts and Papal bulls. (Bulls are documents in which popes define church teaching or enact church law) The new pope affirmed those decisions that the Synod of Spalato had made. He also called on Christians to defend Rome from the invading Arabs. He also enacted laws to protect the sanctity of marriage.

Pope Leo VII (Served from 936-939) Probably a Benedictine monk, Leo VII was elected with the support of Alberic of Spoleto, the ruler of Rome at that time. Leo granted important privileges to monasteries, especially Cluny, and used Odo of Cluny as a mediator. He tried to bring reform to the clergy in ensuring that they help fast to the teachings of the Church. In a crucial moment for the church, Leo VII refused to permit the archbishop of Mainz to force convert and baptize the Jews living in Germany. Unfortunately, and tragically, Leo did give him authority to expel those Jews who did not convert to the Catholic faith from their resident cities throughout Germany.

Pope Leo VIII (Served from 964-965) First elected in 963 as an anti-pope, then elected legitimately in 964. Leo served for no more than two years in the papal office during a chaotic period in the Catholic Church. His ties to the Holy Roman Emperor led to many questionable decisions that perpetuated interference of the emperor in Church affairs.

Pope Saint Leo IX (served from 1049-1054) The primary goals of St. Leo IX were to eliminate the main evils that he saw in the church of his age. He wanted to do away with the selling and buying of church offices (simony), marriage among the clergy (concubinage), and secular ruler appointments of church offices (lay investiture). To accomplish such major reforms to the Catholic Church, Leo understood that he would need to transform the church into the centerpiece of Christian life and society. This very significant pope was famous for a series of Easter Synods by which he issued a number of decrees to accomplish his goals of reform. He led an army of Italians against Norman invaders. (He lost, was held captive for a time, but eventually won the respect and allegiance of the Normans.) He was canonized in 1082 by Pope Gregory VII.

Miraculous Medal Novena


The prayers of the Miraculous Medal Novena are prayed publicly in our parish every Wednesday after the evening Benediction at 6:30PM. We offer public praying of the


