A Message from Our Pastor:

Today's Gospel describes Jesus sending a group of 72 disciples to proclaim the Good News. The number 72 is described by Genesis as referring to different peoples (cf. Gen 10:1-13). So when Jesus said to his disciples: "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few" (cf. Lk 10:2), he outlines a scenario and suggests that we pray, that is, ask the master of the harvest to sent laborers for his harvest (cf. Lk 10:2). This is an element to ensure the mission of evangelization. Jesus did not want to act alone. He came into the world to bring God's love to mankind and to spread it with a style of communion, of brotherhood. So he immediately founded a community of disciples, a missionary community with the urgent purpose of proclaiming the Gospel.

As we hear in today's Gospel, Jesus gave practical instructions for the mission of the disciples. That mission is preaching with great joy; light luggage: "Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals; friendly greetings: Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' what to do: cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you" (Lk: 10). Must have humble and transcendent attitude, accepting what one has to offer, not looking for comfort, ease. Giving the "Mission" to the disciples, Jesus did not tell them "what to preach". He only told them the "must live" details. For Jesus, going out to witness with actions was more important than witnessing with words.

There are three ways of witnessing: speaking, doing, and living. The most efficient are the second and third ways. Everyone knows that it's easy to say, harder to do, and even harder to live as you say. It is our deeds and life that make our words more believable. But even when people haven't said or can't say, haven't done or can't do certain things, they can live what they believe in and want to share. So in order to evangelize persuasively, Christians must live their lives to be credible. If life is trustworthy, then naturally, words are also trustworthy. To be apostles, evangelizers, especially relevant today is to make the Christian life believable. Thus, our whole life must be "testified" by words, manners, communication, in the family, in the society, at work and etc. For people with a sense of mission, anything, any aspect of life, they can be a proclamation and evangelizer.

Let us always recognize our missions and our journey. Let us see ourselves as chosen, sent, instructed, and warned. Let us see our work as important. Let us face all opposition with our faith and the power of the name of Jesus. Let us return rejoicing and be told of even greater joy in heaven.



Saint's Biography | St. Benedict

Have you ever wanted to change the world? 5th century Europe was a dark place. The Roman Empire had fallen, and barbarian tribes were picking over the scraps of what remained. Faith hung on, but there was no consistent, coherent Christian culture in the world around. Young Benedict began his life with education and privilege but became disillusioned by a life pursuing material success. He withdrew to a monastery and spent much time in solitude. He began attracting followers, whom he

organized over time into 12 monasteries, with a 13th established to train young monks. He wrote a rule of life including basic principles for living as Christ. His monks took three vows: conversion to Christ, obedience to the local abbot, and stability to remain with the community. Benedictine monasteries became lights in the darkness, secure centers of Christian culture enlivening the faithful beyond their walls. When the world around us seems complicated and contrary to the Gospel, how will you be a light?

Miraculous Medal Novena


The prayers of the Miraculous Medal Novena are prayed publicly in our parish every Wednesday after the evening Benediction at 6:30PM. We offer public praying of the
