A Message from Our Pastor:

The Church's annual liturgy dedicates September 14th to invite us to celebrate the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross of Jesus with joy because of the grace of salvation. On this day, the Holy Cross is presented not from the perspective of suffering or the heavy essential burden of life that one must carry with Christ, but from the perspective of glory, as a reason for those who believe in Jesus to be proud and without tears.

The Holy Cross, a most brutal and terrible instrument in human history used by the Jews as a means of torment to crucify Jesus, but He transformed it into a means of saving the world. From then on, the Holy Cross became the only Hope in the triumphant Glory of Christ, bestowing upon us the grace of forgiveness and all blessings. Therefore, "we must boast about the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. In Him, we are freed, live, and rise again; it is He who frees and saves us" (Entrance Antiphon).

This is reflected in the readings. Saint Paul regards the Holy Cross as a great motivation to "praise" Jesus: "He humbled Himself and became obedient to death, even death on a cross. Therefore, God exalted Him and gave Him a name above every name" (Phil 2:8-11). According to Saint John, the Holy Cross is like an instrument for human salvation: "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that whoever believes in Him may have eternal life" (John 3:14). So today the Church celebrates the feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross with joy because of the gift of salvation.

Looking at the Holy Cross, we will discover the story of God's love for humanity in general and for each one of us in particular.

The Holy Cross is the wisdom and power of God because "the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom, and the weakness of God is stronger than human strength" (1 Cor: 1:24-25). The Holy Cross has become a sign of love, hope, and life. The Holy Cross is a symbol of saving Love. The Holy Cross is the pride and glory of believers. Saint Paul had a desire: "May I never boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Galatians 6:14).

Jesus died on the cross to prove that He loved the world more than He loved Himself. On the cross, Jesus demonstrated that God's love for us is the highest form of love: Love to the utmost, a total self-giving Love of God. To love is to sacrifice, to give oneself: to give oneself for the good of others. Jesus offered Himself on the cross as a compensation for the salvation of humanity.

The Holy Cross is deeply imprinted and inseparably linked with Jesus Christ. Even after the Lord rose gloriously, the wounds of the passion on the cross remained visible and were not erased. The Cross of Christ transcends time and is present in every moment of our lives. That presence changes everything.

Each of us is living a life for ourselves. Each of us is receiving the cross with different attitudes. Some accept the cross to atone for sins. Some accept the cross out of love for others. And there are also those who are rejecting the cross in their lives. Happiness or suffering depends on the choices we make in life. But whether people want it or not, the cross still exists; the cross of duty; the cross of sacrifice, giving up unjust greed, sinful desires, and petty selfishness. Accepting the cross will bring us peace of mind because we have lived according to our human duties. Accepting the cross is also an opportunity for us to make up for the shortcomings in our lives and those of others.

Accepting the cross is also an opportunity for us to advance toward the glory of resurrection with the Lord in heaven.

We love and worship Jesus on the Holy Cross. In today's consumer and pleasureseeking society, the darkness of power, money, fame, and pleasure is obscuring the shadow of the Holy Cross. We are throwing ourselves into darkness at all costs. Today's society needs to be illuminated by the light of the Holy Cross. From the Cross of Christ comes love that blesses the world, life that fills the human heart. To venerate the Holy Cross is to venerate the love and life of Christ.

May the Lord, who was pleased to accept the cross for us, support and help us carry the daily cross as we follow Him. May the Lord help us to live a noble life of sacrifice so that we do not regret the past, but always have peace because we have fulfilled our duties with love for God and love for others. Amen.


