A Message from Our Pastor:

In the Gospel readings of recent Sundays, Jesus taught the apostles to pray with trust, gratitude, and perseverance. This Sunday, He continues to teach them to pray in a spirit of humility and repentance, because God always shows love to the righteous, the poor and humble. To express this idea, Jesus presented the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector praying in the Temple.

While praying, the two had very different and opposing attitudes. The Pharisee was self-satisfied, boasting about his good deeds. He thought that because of these good deeds, God must grant him salvation, and he even showed contempt for the sinful tax collector.

We must remember that before God, we are all sinners. The Pharisee was not humble enough to recognize that he was a sinner, but instead took pride in being righteous before God. In contrast, the tax collector had nothing to boast about. He knew he was a sinner, spoke few words, but the attitude of his heart pleased God. His humble prayer of admitting that he was a sinner and asking for mercy earned him forgiveness.

People who often judge others harshly usually know very little about themselves. To truly know oneself, one must humbly acknowledge one's faults. A person who does not acknowledge their own faults can easily cause harm to others. A person who knows their own faults is more likely to be cautious in words and actions to try to avoid causing harm when dealing with others. The Pharisee's prayer was only to boast about himself and despise others. He separated himself from others and placed himself above everyone, feeling proud of himself. Therefore, he did not receive the grace of God's forgiveness.

Prayer is opening the heart to receive God's love. Prayer is when we look inside and back at our actions to clearly recognize our own weaknesses. We need to be aware of our shortcomings in order to open our hearts to receive God's forgiving love. Prayer is not the time to compare ourselves with others or to recount our merits, but to place ourselves before the holiness and justice of God, as Saint Paul shared with the Corinthians: "It does not concern me in the least that I be judged by you or any human tribunal; I do not even pass judgment on myself; I am not conscious of anything against me, but I do not thereby stand acquitted; the one who judges me is the Lord " (1 Corinthians 4:3-4). Only when we place ourselves before the light of God do we clearly see our imperfections and shortcomings, and through that, we can open our hearts to receive God's mercy.

Humility has the power to transform sinfulness into holiness, unjustness into righteousness. Conversely, pride and complacency can turn good into evil. Humility, self-abasement, and self-forgetfulness are always regarded as the foundation of holiness, the root of virtues. No amount of humility is ever enough, but even a little pride is too much. Do not close yourself off in complacency because of your own righteousness, nor close yourself off in despair because of your sins.

God's grace only comes to those who open their hearts to receive it. Both sin and merit can cause us to close ourselves off or open up. The important thing is to always see that we need God. Spiritual growth lies in becoming smaller, in stepping aside to allow God to take over and completely govern our lives. The more we grow in God, the more strongly we feel our increasing need for Him.

Lord Jesus, grant us the humility to beat our breasts and acknowledge our faults and sins so that we may always receive Your mercy and forgiveness.

Miraculous Medal Novena


The prayers of the Miraculous Medal Novena are prayed publicly in our parish every Wednesday after the evening Benediction at 6:30PM. We offer public praying of the


Knights of Columbus Pilgrimage to Italy

Family we would like to reach out to our parishioners in need of assistance. It is through our generous sharing of our gifts that we can thank Our Lord for His kindness and generosity to us.


